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Make a plan to check in regularly about schoolwork. If you keep up with your tests, papers, attendance and homework assignments, you can celebrate successes and head off problems early on. Get homework tips here.

Getting involved in clubs and other groups is a great way for you to identify interests and feel more engaged in school. In a normal year, we hold events, including a club day to get students interested in all that NFA has to offer!

(Examples of clubs include: fencing, astronomy, future teachers, Debate, Yearbook, Photo club, PRISM, Youth in Government)

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Get ready to take the PSAT/NMSQT, if your school offers it to sophomores. Taking the test in the fall can help you prepare for the SAT and get on track for college. Sophomores can also use their score reports to figure out which academic areas they need to work on. Learn more about the PSAT/NMSQT.

Traditionally, we offer the PSAT in October at NFA. However, this year, we are not offering the PSAT at this time. The PSAT is a practice SAT. It helps a student see how they might do on the SAT when they take it usually in their 11th grade year.

10th Grade Winter Plan

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Most students take the SAT in their 11th grade year. However, some students do take it in their 10th grade year.

The purpose of the **SAT** is to measure a high school student's readiness for college, and provide colleges with one common data point that can be **used** to compare all applicants.

The <u>SAT</u> covers Reading, Writing and Math

Some colleges require or recommend that you take **SAT Subject Tests**, especially if you're applying to take specific courses or programs. See a list of colleges that require, recommend, or consider Subject Tests.



An alternative to the SAT is the ACT - Always check with the colleges you are thinking about to know what type of exam they want.

The <u>ACT</u> covers English, Math, Reading and Science
