


SECONDARY LEVEL LEADERSHIP

Empowering Assistant Principals Through Targeted Professional Learning

The Assistant Superintendent of Secondary Level convened campus leaders for a focused series of meetings to strengthen instructional practices and enhance student engagement across secondary schools. Leaders reviewed the district's WalkThrough Tool, analyzing data and collaborating on strategies to improve classroom environment and engagement. Assistant principals also engaged in reflective leadership by sharing their personal "Why," highlighting the passion and purpose behind their work. The session closed with a shared sense of clarity and commitment to ensuring high-quality instruction and meaningful student engagement in every secondary classroom.


SECONDARY LEVEL LEADERSHIP

STEM

Our Director of STEM, Dr. Jeanine Hall, has been actively engaged in building meaningful connections with students and staff through regular classroom walkthroughs. These visits provide opportunities to foster positive relationships while observing and supporting students' academic and social-emotional growth in real time. Individualized curricular support has been provided to teachers through one-on-one coaching sessions. These personalized meetings allow for collaboration on instructional strategies, address specific classroom needs, and ensure that the curriculum is being implemented effectively across all learning environments. In science, the focus has been on implementing phenomena-based learning and storyline approaches that engage students in authentic, inquiry-driven experiences. Dr. Hall has also been supporting teachers as they navigate the new State-required Investigations, assisting with the integration of these components seamlessly into their instruction.



Additionally, Dr. Hall has been working closely with teachers to integrate Solara, the district's specialized AI tool, into their daily practice. Through these one-on-one training sessions, educators are being supported in leveraging data-driven insights to make informed instructional decisions that directly impact student achievement and learning outcomes.





HUMANITIES

Secondary ELA & Social Studies Dive Into Panorama at November 4th PD

On November 4th, Secondary English Language Arts and Social Studies teachers participated in a dynamic Professional Development day focused on the power of artificial intelligence in classroom instruction.

Grades 9–12 ELA teachers joined the session Seeing Literature Deeply: Using Parts, Purposes & Complexities With Panorama Solara to Strengthen Literary Thinking and Writing, facilitated by Humanities Director Ms. Carolyne St. Louis. Teachers explored the Panorama Solara AI tool and used it to design lessons within their current unit plans. By incorporating the Parts–Purposes–Complexities routine, teachers developed strategies to help students break down complex literary texts and strengthen their analytical writing.

Middle and high school Social Studies teachers engaged in rich collegial conversations centered on designing Regents-style questions using Panorama Solara.

Facilitated by Middle Level Director Ms.
Mariya Pushkantser, and Humanities
Director Ms. Carolyne St. Louis, the session
provided a rare opportunity for grades
6–12 educators to examine the skills
students need as they transition from
middle school to high school. More

Teachers Collaborate Across Grade Levels

On November 4, middle school and high school teachers came together for a professional development workshop focused on aligning instruction with the Next Generation Standards and new Regents exam expectations. Led by Carolyne Monereau-St. Louis, Director of Humanities, and Mariya Pushkantser, Director of Middle Level, teachers worked in mixed-level groups spanning grades 6-12 to explore how AI tools like Panorama and Solara can support standards-based instruction. Similarly, Dr. Jeanine Hall, Director of STEM and Mariya Pushkantser collaborated on a workshop for the Science Teachers. Participants in both workshops analyzed Regents-style questions to identify the skills being assessed, then practiced crafting purposeful AI prompts to generate rigorous classroom activities aligned to literacy standards across content areas The collaborative session emphasized the key instructional shifts required by the new standards, including focusing on conceptual understanding, fostering student inquiry, and integrating content with skills. Teachers concluded the workshop by sharing their Al prompts in a gallery walk and reflecting on how to help students think critically within the disciplines rather than simply respond to test questions. Meanwhile, Math teachers 6-12 engaged in a workshop on Building Thinking Classrooms to embed discourse and collaboration in math classrooms.

Following the keynote, students participated in breakout sessions then worked in school groups to discuss how they could bring what they learned back to our school community. WORLD LANGUAGES

This past November 4th, during the Superintendent Professional Development ½ Day, World Language teachers engaged in a session titled World Language Standards-Based Lesson Planning Using Panorama where teachers explored using a Solara Tool in Panorama to create World Language lessons aligned to the World Language Standards, Topics, and Themes as per the NYSED Office of Bilingual Education & World Languages (OBEWL).

On November 5, Dr. Martinez-Morales submitted the Seal of Biliteracy District Notification Form due annually to NYSED OBEWL as part of the process for implementing the NYS Seal of Biliteracy for the 25-26 School Year.

On Tuesday, November 18, our juniors and seniors, representing NECSD at the Hudson Valley PRHYLI delegation, attended the second PRHYLI session of the 2025–2026 school year held at Dominican University! Our NECSD PRHYLI scholars are in the process of learning how to research, study, and debate bills such as Health & Mental Health Policy A05305; as part of the bills that students will be

debating at the 2026 PRHYLI Mock Assembly at the state Capitol in Albany this coming Spring!

Data-Driven Instruction Guides Student Learning

Our middle school teachers recently administered unit assessments aligned to grade-level standards and their curriculum maps. Following the assessments, teachers analyzed student performance data to identify areas of strength and opportunities for growth. This careful review of student progress allows our educators to make informed decisions about next steps, including targeted reteaching, small group intervention, and enrichment opportunities for students who have demonstrated mastery. By consistently using data to drive instruction, our teachers ensure that all students receive the support they need to meet and exceed learning expectations.



District-Wide Professional Development: Strengthening Instructional Alignment

This past November 4th & November 5th, the Division of Curriculum & Instruction offered Professional Development sessions during the Superintendent ½ Days. The professional development choices included ELL-Specific sessions open to all teachers in grades K-12, as well as sessions specific to ENL, Transitional Bilingual, and Dual Language programs.

One of the sessions at the Secondary level, (see picture above) titled: Adapting Discourse: Exploring Language Transfer and Communicative Competence by Martha Young was attended by ELA and ENL teachers. Another session attended by ELA and ENL teachers K-8 was Leveraging ELL Data to Enhance Writing Instruction Using Panorama by Silvana Diaz-Paron. During this session, teachers learned how to use Solara and data from Panorama to plan differentiated instruction for ELLs in their classrooms. Additional coaching and support opportunities have stemmed from these professional learning sessions.

During the K-12 ELL Department Meetings held in November, Dr. Martinez-Morales shared information about the NYSED transition from NYSESLAT/NYSITELL to WIDA starting in 2027 as well as continued professional learning sessions about Panorama & Solara.

Translation support for our parents was coordinated and provided during Parent-Teacher-Conferences, including for ASL (American Sign Language).




MUSIC & FINE PERFORMING ARTS


