PROPOSITIONS

PROPOSITION 1 - THE SCHOOL BUDGET

Shall the Board of Education of the Newburgh Enlarged City School District be authorized to expend the sum of money which will be required for school district purposes for the year July 1, 2025-June 30, 2026 in the amount of \$379,252,199 and to levy the necessary tax therefor?

PROPOSITION 2 - THE NEWBURGH FREE LIBRARY BUDGET

Shall the Board of Education of the Newburgh Enlarged City School District be authorized to levy taxes in the amount of \$5,996,436 for library purposes for the year July 1, 2025-June 30, 2026, for the support of the Newburgh Free Library, to enable the library to provide free library services for the benefit and free use of all residents of the school district?

PROPOSITION 3 - NEWBURGH FREE ACADEMY - NORTH CAMPUS IMPROVEMENTS

Shall the Board of Education of the Newburgh Enlarged City School District, Orange County, New York be authorized to perform certain alteration, reconstruction and renovation work, including replacement of equipment and furnishings, for the Auditorium at Newburgh Free Academy - North Campus, to include stage rigging, refinish stage flooring, auditorium and stage lighting, sound system, new seating, code compliant balcony handrails, repaint concrete flooring and replace carpet, code compliant auditorium entry doors and frames, and flaking/ peeling paint, including incidental and associated work related thereto at a maximum expenditure of \$3,272,219, and that the sum of \$3,272,219 is hereby authorized to be expended from the District's "Buildings and Facilities Improvement Reserve Fund" established in 2016, and amended in 2021, and transferred to the capital fund to pay for such Project, and such expenditure and transfer are hereby approved?

PROPOSITION 4 - FOSTERTOWN AND GARDNERTOWN IMPROVEMENTS

Shall the Bond Resolution adopted by the Board of Education of the Newburgh Enlarged City School District (the "District") on April 8, 2025 authorizing (A) a District-wide capital improvement project consisting of the construction and reconstruction of improvements to Fostertown and Gardnertown Elementary Schools, including the acquisition and installation of original furnishings, equipment, machinery, apparatus, and other services incidental thereto; at a maximum cost not to exceed \$33,000,000; (B) the expenditure of \$3,000,000 from the District's existing Buildings and Facilities Improvement Reserve Fund to pay a portion of the costs of such additions, alterations, renovations and improvements; and (C) the issuance of up to \$30,000,000 principal amount of serial bonds of said District pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 33-a of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York to finance the estimated cost of said specific objects or purposes; providing that such bonds will be payable from amounts to be levied in annual installments on all the taxable real property in said District as provided in Section 416 of the Education Law, with such tax being offset by State grants and building aid available therefore; pledging the faith and credit of said District for the payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds; determining that the period of probable usefulness thereof and maximum maturity of the bonds therefor is thirty years; and delegating the power to authorize and sell bond anticipation notes and to fix the details of and to sell bonds, be approved?

¿Debe autorizarse a la Junta de Educación del Distrito Escolar de Gran Alcance de la Ciudad de Newburgh a que grave impuestos por la cantidad de \$5 996 436.00 para fines relacionados con la biblioteca para el año que va desde el primero de julio de 2025 hasta el 30 de junio de 2026, como apoyo a la Biblioteca Pública de Newburgh (Newburgh Free Library) a fin de que esta pueda brindar sus servicios gratis y todos los residentes de este distrito escolar se beneficien al usarla gratuitamente?

PROPUESTA 3 – NEWBURGH FREE ACADEMY – MEJORAS AL CAMPUS NORTE

¿Debe autorizarse a la Junta de Educación del Distrito Escolar de Gran Alcance de la Ciudad de Newburgh, en el condado de Orange, en Nueva York, a realizar cierto trabajo de modificación, reconstrucción y renovación, incluyendo el reemplazo de equipo y muebles, al auditorio de Newburgh Free Academy - Campus Norte, que incluya implementación de maquinaria escénica, remozamiento del piso del escenario, luces para el auditorio y el escenario, sistema de sonido, nuevos asientos, barandas del balcón conforme con los códigos, pintura del suelo de concreto y reemplazo de la alfombra, puertas de entrada y marcos del auditorio conforme con los códigos, y la pintura que se está pelando o descascarando, incluyendo trabajo imprevisto y relacionado con ello con un gasto que sea como máximo \$3 272 219.00, y que, por el presente documento, se autorice a que esta suma de \$3 272 219.00 se gaste del "Fondo de reserva para mejoras de los edificios e instalaciones" del Distrito, establecido en 2016 y corregido en 2021, y se transfiera al fondo capital para pagar por tal proyecto, y que, por el presente documento, tal gasto y transferencia se aprueben?

PROPUESTA 4 - MEJORAS EN FOSTERTOWN Y GARDNERTOWN

¿Debe aprobarse la resolución de sobre bonos, que la Junta de Educación del Distrito Escolar de Gran Alcance de la Ciudad de Newburgh (el "Distrito") aprobó el 8 de abril de 2025, la cual autoriza a (A) un proyecto de mejora de capital para todo el Distrito, que consiste en la construcción y reconstrucción de mejoras a las escuelas primarias de Fostertown y Gardnertown, incluyendo la adquisición e instalación de muebles originales, equipo, maquinaria, aparatos y otros servicios imprevistos a ello; por un costo máximo que no sobrepase los \$33 000 000.00; (B) el gasto de \$33 000 000.00 del Fondo de reserva para mejoras de los edificios e instalaciones del Distrito para pagar una parte de los gastos de tales agregados, modificaciones, renovaciones y mejoras; y (C) el otorgamiento de hasta \$30 000 000.00 de la cantidad principal de bonos en serie de tal Distrito, de conformidad con las disposiciones de la Ley Financiera Local, que constituye el Capítulo 33-a de las leyes consolidadas del estado de Nueva York para financiar el costo estimado de estos objetos o fines específicos, siempre y cuando tales bonos se paguen de las cantidades que se graven en cuotas anuales de todos los bienes inmuebles pasibles de impuestos de dicho distrito, tal como se estipula en el artículo 416 de la Ley de Educación, sabiendo que tal impuesto es compensado por los subsidios del estado y la ayuda para los locales que por consiguiente existe; apelando a la fe y crédito de tal distrito para el pago del capital e intereses de dichos bonos; con la conclusión de que el periodo de probable utilidad y vencimiento de los bonos es de treinta días, y delegándole el poder para autorizar y vender pagarés anticipados de bonos y para establecer los detalles de los bonos y poder venderlos?

PROPOSITION 3 WILL UTILIZE RESERVE FUNDS AND HAVE A \$0 TAX IMPACT ON VOTERS. PROPOSITION 4 IS CONTINGENT UPON GRANT FUNDING. WILL UTILIZE BUILDING AID, GRANT FUNDS, AND RESERVE FUNDS IF NEEDED. WILL HAVE A \$0 TAX IMPACT ON VOTERS.

DISTRICT AND LIBRARY PARTNER WITH NEA

The Newburgh Enlarged City School District and Newburgh Free Library, in partnership with the National

Endowment for the Arts (NEA) Big Read are collaborating to provide programming to our community. Through a grant, the collaboration will provide a series of literacy initiatives to educate and collaborate with our local community. The Newburgh Free Library is one of 62 communities nationwide participating in the 2024-2025 NEA Big Read. Newburgh Enlarged City School District is the only school district in the country to receive a National Endowment for the Arts Big Read Community grant.

From September 2024 through June 2025, Newburgh will explore the theme of "Where We Live" through poetry utilizing the featured reading of Hustle by David Tomas Martinez. With a focus on the rich history of our community, programming will inspire meaningful conversations and celebrate local creativity and voices.

Programming will focus on literacy in our community. Throughout the year, we plan for book giveaways, book discussions, Q&A with the author, an artistic project or activity that engages the community around the theme, creative writing workshops, public readings, book clubs, poetry workshops, infusion of dance as it relates to the theme and focus, oral history and family writing workshop, open mic events, walking tours, food sampling, and so much more!

OVER 1200 STUDENTS GO ON COLLEGE VISITS

The district is invested in exposing our scholars to college and career opportunities. This year alone, more than 1200 elementary, middle,

and high school scholars have visited 29 colleges throughout New York State to immerse themselves in college life for a tour, learn about requirements, and better understand how to prepare for these future possibilities.

DISTRICT HOLDS RIGHT TO READ MOVIE SCREENING AND PANEL DISCUSSION

Recently the district held a free movie screening of The Right to Read. The Right to Read shares the stories of an activist, a teacher, and two American families who fight to provide our youngest generation with the most foundational indicator of lifelong success: the ability to read.

When a child can't read, their chances of incarceration, homelessness, and unemployment increase. That's why Oakland-based NAACP activist Kareem Weaver believes literacy is one of the greatest civil rights issues of our time and is fighting for better reading instruction. What good is winning the right to vote if we can't even read the ballot? Fed up with the bleak reading scores in his own community, Kareem files a petition with the Oakland Unified School District demanding change. The film explores the need for reading education, the struggles some communities face, and discusses possible solutions.

After the film, a panel discussion was conducted with teachers, a reading specialist, parent, and NFA students. Questions were asked by the audience and a thorough and informative discussion took place. As we work together as a community, it is essential for all of us to focus on the reading skills of our scholars. This event was in alignment with the district's emphasis on The Science of Reading, a vast, interdisciplinary body of scientifically-based research about reading and issues related to reading and writing. Panelists and Moderators included **Ms. Crisan Crozzoli**, 5th Grade Teacher, **Ms. Melissa Lamar**, 1st Grade Teacher, **Ndeye Thiam**, NFA Main student; NFA Black History Club, **Ms. Alexis Yakle**, NECSD Parent & Former Reading Teacher, **Ms. Jonna Rao**, Wilson Reading Specialist; Kindergarten Teacher, **Ms. Hildelisa Prado**, Bilingual Kindergarten Teacher, **Ms. Marcie Heywood** - Moderator, Director of Elementary Education, and **Dr. Chastity Martinez-Morales** - Moderator, Director of Language Acquisition. Remarks were also provided by **Dr. Lisa Buon**, Acting Superintendent, **Mr. Kyle Conway**, President, NAACP Newburgh-Highland Falls Chapter, and students **Santos Garcia** and **Alexandria Crawford**.

Newburgh Free Academy (NFA) has been named a National Banner Unified Champion School in its class of recognized schools for 2024. Newburgh Free Academy is one of thirteen (13) schools in New York State to earn this prestigious honor. This distinction marks the highest level of achievement for Unified Champion Schools in the nation, recognizing their leadership in creating inclusive school communities where all students are accepted and celebrated. In Special Olympics Unified Champion Schools, students with and without disabilities play on the same sports teams and take physical education courses together. Students learn inclusive leadership skills and lead campaigns and activities that engage the entire school community to encourage and promote inclusion among their peers.

was unanimously voted to receive the Good Sportsmanship Award by every coach in Section IX this year, which is a tremendous honor for Elle and a wonderful representation of herself, her team, and her school.





NFA ALUMNUS WILLIAM "WILLIE" FRASER HONORED BY NFA BASEBALL TEAM

William "Willie" Fraser, NFA Alumnus (1982), was recognized and celebrated by the NFA Baseball team with a plaque and banner in right field of Delano Hitch Stadium. Fraser was a dominant pitcher for the Goldbacks and went on to

pitch at Concordia College where he developed a forkball which drew comparisons to future Hall of Famer Bruce Sutter's. The California Angels selected him with the fifteenth pick in the 1985 MLB draft, ahead of future Hall of Famers Randy Johnson and John Smoltz. This draft also featured perennial MLB all-stars Barry Bonds, Will Clark, Barry Larkin, and Rafael Palmeiro to name a few. Fraser's MLB career spanned 8 seasons, winning 38 games while playing for the Angels, Toronto Blue Jays, St. Louis Cardinals, Florida Marlins, and Montreal Expos. He also spent 3 years in Japan, picking up 25 more wins playing for the Orix BlueWave. That team won the Japan Series Championship in 1996. Willie is currently in the scouting department for the Kansas City Royals and has worked with many local pitchers, providing coaching to hone their craft, including many current and former Goldback players.



NFA WRESTLING CROWNS STATE CHAMPION FOR THIRD CONSECUTIVE YEAR

NFA's Will Soto (108lb.) won the Wrestling State Championship title for the second consecutive year, reigning champ Cooper Merli (116lb.) placed second (state champion in 2023 and 2024), and NFA's Wrestling team placed 3rd overall in the state meet. The most athletes in NFA team history contributed to the team's success including Will Soto (108lb.) placed first, Cooper Merli (116lb.) placed 2nd, Chris Leggett (215 lb.) placed 4th, Matthew Mercado (131 lb.) placed 8th, Jordan Busby (116lb.), and William Coughlin (190lbs.) also competed at the NYS Championship competition. Will Soto, Cooper Merli, and Chris Leggett each earned All-State honors during the meet.



STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS BOYS SWIMMING

The NFA Boys Swimming & Diving team captured their 31st Section IX Championship title - the most in Section IX history! The team sent five athletes to compete at the state championship competition. Jack Mummery finished 8th overall in the 200m freestyle and 14th overall in the 500m freestyle. Peyton Tuttle finished 42nd in the 500m freestyle. Overall, the team finished 28th in the state.

BOYS TRACK AND FIELD SENDS 5 TO STATES

Brady Danyluk placed first in the Bovs Indoor Track & Field 1000m run at the NYS qualifiers, finishing 3rd in the Federation at the state championship meet in the 1000m run with a time of 2:29.88. Jaden Williams took home the third place finish in the Triple Jump at the state qualifiers and finished 6th in the Federation at the state championship meet in the triple jump with a jump of 45' 5.25". The 4x800 Relay team finished second at the state qualifiers, advancing to compete at states. The relay team consisted of Devin Batelic, Joey Lopez, Oren Miller, and Brady Danyluk. Alternates include: Miles Davis, Kendy Georges, Bryan Arenas, and Gianni Graham.

NATIONAL BOARD CERTIFIED TEACHERS

The Newburgh Enlarged City School District recognizes and celebrates 36 current and retired teachers who have achieved National Board Certification and 11 additional candidates who are currently pursuing certification.

National Board Certification is considered the "gold standard" of teaching, and SUNY recognizes those teachers who have achieved National Board Certification as having the equivalent of a Doctorate degree in the pedagogy of their certification area. Once certified, the journey is not over as these teachers need to maintain their certification and renew it every 5 years.

In the most recent cycle (2023-2024), 47 teachers in New York State achieved National Board Certification. The NECSD cohort had great success, as 6 teachers achieved National Board Certification. This was the highest rate of achievement for any one district (13% of the

entire state). Congratulations to our new National Board Certified Teachers: Christine Baumann, Katherine DiThomas, Jacqueline Hesse, Tara Lapierre, Jessica Torres, and Sharon Wagner.

National Board Certification is a voluntary process designed for teachers to demonstrate, through standards-based evidence, the positive impact they have on student learning as a result of their deep and abiding understanding of students, content knowledge, pedagogical practice, ongoing reflection, and participation in learning communities. Candidates for Board certification submit evidence through the use of student work samples, lesson videos, written summaries, and reflection, showing that their practice meets the Five Core Propositions and National Board Standards for their content area.

The cohort exists because of the collaboration between the Newburgh Teachers' Association, the Newburgh Teacher Center, and the Newburgh Enlarged City School District. The cohort offers a variety of supports for candidates pursuing certification.
